### Dear parents, carers, and friends of Stoke Newington School,

I am delighted to welcome all our students to the start of our academic year 2016-7. I hope they are all rested, refreshed and ready to continue their educational journey with us. In particular I want to warmly welcome any students new to us in Year 7, Year 12 or who are joining us in other years. I look forward to meeting parents and carers during this year: our effective partnership to support our young people is crucial to them achieving and thriving.

I am also pleased to be reporting to you that our students have achieved very strong results at GCSE and A level this summer. Congratulations to all involved. The GCSE and A levels, on many measures, are the strongest we have yet achieved as a school: you can find more about these on our website. You may be aware that the government has changed the way in which school results are reported for Year 11, so this may be the final year of us reporting 5A\*-C including English and Maths. It is good to go out on a high! The new measures include progress and a wider range of subjects – so are a fairer measure in many ways. The focus on getting English and Maths still remains – these subjects are crucial for all our students.

I am also pleased that we have had so many applications to our sixth form. This year we have reached capacity on our sixth form numbers and have a waiting list to join us. The consistent success of our sixth form is a real source of pride for me. I am looking forward to some new sixth form initiatives this year too – with all Year 12 students taking up volunteering opportunities and other additional activities.

At the end of last term we carried out a survey with all our students. The survey results are back and we look forward to sharing outcomes more widely with the students. The positive points they raised were that we have high expectations of them, that the rules and routines around school are clear to them and the great majority enjoy school. The points they raised that we want to take forward are that they want behaviour in all lessons to be excellent, they want more praise, they want to be more involved in school decisions and that they want more careers advice.

We have certainly taken forward the first two aspects (excellent behaviour and praise) with staff at the start of this term – and I will be talking more about this at the parents' forum this term. The careers and pastoral team will be planning how best to get more information to students too. Myself and governors really want to make sure our students are fully involved in school life too: we'll be talking further with students about this, and how to ensure every one of our school student community feels involved and listened to on a regular basis.

I know that all our students have great potential. I want to see every one of them realising that potential in their academic studies and in the wider life of our school and community. Listening to and involving the students is crucial for all of the staff. By doing so we can understand further how to improve things for our young people individually and collectively — and we engage them further in the life of our school. We will be making student voice a real priority this year to ensure we further enable everyone to achieve and thrive.

#### A level

80% of the A level students at Stoke Newington School & Sixth Form in Hackney have achieved top grades – A\*, A, B or C – in their exams this year. The A\*, A, B percentage is 54%.

The overall A level pass rate for SNS students is 99.5%. We fully expect to be rated "outstanding" for the progress our sixth form students make.

The AS results for sixth form students are also up significantly, despite the changes introduced across the country in these examinations. A very high 44% of students' grades at AS are A or  $A^*$ . In addition the pass rate for the school at AS has increased by 9%. All the proportions are well above national averages.

Students achieved A and A\* grades at A and AS level in a range of subjects including Art, Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry,

Classics, Drama, Economics, English Literature, Film Studies, Further Maths, History, Maths, Media, Photography, Physics, Politics, Psychology, Sociology, Spanish, Sports Studies, Textiles and Turkish.

Students from our community school have gained places at a range of universities over the past three years including six to Oxford or Cambridge, three to Imperial College and a number to medical school and prestigious Art schools. This year students are choosing to read a range of subjects from art through Mathematics to Medicine and Games Design.

We are really pleased that our comprehensive and inclusive intake have also achieved an overall 99.5% A\*-E pass rate and BTEC 100%.





#### **GCSE**

Stoke Newington School, our community comprehensive school, has again improved GCSE results this year, with the number of students getting five A\* to C grades including English and maths rising by 12% over the last two years to 69% (national rates appear to be stable in the same period).

All told, just over 70% percent of students gained both English and Maths GCSEs this year. The 5A\*-C including Maths and English outcomes will be at least 10% above last year's national average.

More than 75% of students gained A\* to C grades in each of the core subjects of Maths and English – a rise on last year's figures. The school's creative subjects continue to excel with outstanding results in Art, Drama, Media, Music and Photography. 39% of our students achieved the English Baccalaureate – up from last year and well above the 24%

national figure from last year. English Baccalaureate subjects performed very strongly with Science, History and Spanish gaining A's and A\*'s at significantly above the national rate.

The new measures introduced by the government also indicate excellent progress by our students with the new Progress 8 measure predicted to be highly positive at 0.47.

Crispin Truman, Chair of Governors, said that "We are very pleased that students at our inclusive school are doing so well. We continue to achieve results which are well above national averages. We are particularly proud of our value added – which again looks to put us in the top 10% – almost all our pupils make strong progress."



#### **Traid workshop**

In July my textiles class took part in a Traid workshop. Traid is a charity that works to help lower the rate at which clothes are going to the rubbish dump. They do this by reusing or adapting old clothes so that they can have a new lease of life.

There are black Traid banks around Hackney for the public to put their old clothes in. These clothes then go directly to a Traid warehouse where they're hand-sorted into five groups; vintage, top end, basics, ethnic/linen and kids.

There's also another section where clothes have extensive stains or tears that are beyond repair. They are sent to another warehouse where they're shredded and can be used inside furniture such as sofas or armchairs. If a garment has a small rip that can be easily repaired, there's a group of volunteers that take these clothes home to mend them. Once
