Drugs Policy

- Drugs are substances that alter the mind or body. This policy is concerned with legal drugs, over the counter and prescribed drugs, and illegal drugs.
- We believe that the possession and use of drugs or paraphernalia associated with drugs in school, during the school day, on a school visit or while on the way home by any pupil is inappropriate.
- All drugs covered by this policy are not permitted to be brought to, sold, passed on or obtained on school premises during the school day, on a school visit or while on the way home.
- Responses will include both disciplinary and counselling approach.

Drugs Education

- This school provides a planned drug education curriculum for all pupils within Life Skills, which aims
 to equip all students with the knowledge and skills to be able to make informed decisions about
 drugs.
- We believe that those students who are misusing illegal drugs or volatile substances should be encouraged to seek help at the earliest possible stage.
- The Pastoral system will support this work through appropriate tutor/assembly time discussions.

Disclosure & Confidentiality

Students need to feel able to talk in confidence to members of staff about drug-related problems without fear of being judged or being told off.

When a student discloses to a member of staff that he/she has been using drugs, or is concerned about someone else's drug use:

- Staff will be non-judgemental and caring and will show concern for the pupils' welfare.
- Staff must say that they will not be able to promise complete confidentiality.
- The YCC and form tutor will be informed. Confidentiality will be maintained beyond certain key people, including the YCC, form tutor, and the Leadership Team.
- Any student who is discovered taking or having taken drugs will be referred to SSN in order to allocate appropriate targeted intervention (this may be through an external partner).

Managing drug related incidents:

Guidance for YCCs and LT:

Searching pupils

If a pupil is believed to be in possession of a controlled substance "the law permits school staff to take temporary possession of a substance suspected of being a controlled drug".

- Normally staff members do not have the right to search the student unless they have his/her
 consent. Students can be asked to surrender the substance or turn out their pockets. This should
 always be done with a witness present.
- Should students refuse to consent to a search, staff should consider contacting parents in order to discuss the situation. LT should be involved at this stage.

Dealing with illegal substances

• **Storage**: If the police are to be involved, the substance should be packaged with date, time and place of finding noted on the pack, witnessed by a colleague.

• **Disposal**: witnessed being incinerated or flushed away. If the police are to be involve, the substance should handed to police.

Police involvement

In most cases any punishment is likely to be a school and not a police matter. However, it is the
policy of this school to contact the attached police officer where an incident has involved illegal
substances.

Contacting the police: In all cases, guidance should be sought from the Headteacher.

Further Guidance:

Parental involvement

- Parents will be contacted if their child is caught breaking the rules on drugs.
- Opportunities will be made available for parents to get support and guidance concerning drugs and other health related issues.

Administering medicines

- The Headteacher will make the decision for staff to administer medicines.
- All medicines will be stored securely in the office with access by first aider and LT.

Training and support for staff

Drugs Policy Review Date - Summer 2013

- The Head of Life Skills has responsibility for ensuring drug education within the curriculum.
- This policy is reviewed annually and in light of any incidents that occur related to drugs.
