## Leila gets animated!



Thousands of refugees face a harsh winter in makeshift camps across Europe and desperately need better shelter, warm clothing and food. Staff and students at SNS care deeply about raising awareness of their plight and showing our support by raising greatly needed funds.


AS Citizenship built a Refugee Camp Installation, as part of the Active Citizenship element of their course. They sourced tents, sleeping bags and tarpaulin from members of staff and constructed a camp site. Unfortunately the days that followed brought gale force winds and heavy rains, which completely destroyed the camp site. To watch this and think that families, and children particularly, lived in these conditions was very powerful and instigated a lot of discussion in the playground about how hard it is and what we could do to help.

On Wednesday 9 December, five members of staff and myself slept in these tents. We had no access to hot water, heating or toilets and came into work as normal the next day. The purpose of this was to again illustrate the suffering experienced by so many, whilst simultaneously raising money through sponsorship. We were well prepared for the cold weather, but not as prepared for the foxes chewing the guy ropes! All in all, it went as well as we could have hoped and we have raised over £3000 – more than tripling our target! We are hugely grateful for all of our sponsors and the kind words of support from students, parents, colleagues and governors.

Lastly, thank you to Danielle Parker, Juliet Cook, Afra Cory, Jim Brown and Alex Sherston for giving up their warm beds for the night and contributing to this huge achievement!

## Reep Hair



Abdul Alibhai, Stephan Singh and Piotr Ozgur are putting pressure on the Premier League to use Fairtrade footballs for all matches.

Football stitchers live in countries such as India, Pakistan and Bangladesh, and they get paid under 20p a day for hand-stitching the panels on to footballs. We use those footballs here!

Meanwhile, the Premier League pumps millions into Britain's favourite sport and footballers are paid extraordinarily large sums of money!

These football stitchers, who are often children too, work up to 20 hours a day, are not protected by health and safety regulations and are forced to work and make footballs in unsafe places in order for other people around the world to buy them at high prices. These people have no choice over where they work as they are the poor and vulnerable who get paid hardly anything in order to survive. These people are being exploited and it is our fault! It is our demand for branded footballs that keep the supply coming.

Our e-petition aims are to persuade the Premier League and its CEO, Richard Scudamore, to purchase and use Fairtrade footballs. This action would change the lives of those who stitch the footballs – they would get paid fairly, get better working

conditions and help their communities with education and healthcare.

"In India, the average wage for people stitching balls is 20 rupees, a third of the minimum wage of 63 rupees."

Fairtrade footballs will give people a fairer wage for making the footballs. Fairtrade helps them by making schools for the younger generation to be educated and have a brighter future. They also provide medicine for the old and the ill. They provide homes and re-build a whole community. Nike, Adidas, Puma and many more brands that make footballs do not provide education, houses, medicine and food for their workers and do not improve their communities!

We must try to encourage people to buy Fairtrade footballs as it is England's most popular sport, played by many!

# RED KYTE FLY HIGH AT THE ROYAL ALBERT HALL

Stoke Newington band Red Kyte had the considerable honour of playing at the Royal Albert Hall in the Music For Youth Proms 2015. Guitarist and SNS sixth former Robbie McGrail tells us what it was like to play in one of the UK's most prestigious music venues.



Along with a kaleidoscope of young musicians in Britain, from Stoke Newington to the Orkney Isles, Red Kyte played at the Music For Youth Proms on Monday 23rd November. Our band consists of three current Stoke Newington Sixth Form students – myself (Robbie McGrail) on guitar, Hector O'Shea on bass and James Westwood as the drummer, with former SNS student, Hal Dixon on vocals.

We formed several years ago, playing in school concerts, parents' parties, hired venues, pubs and finally, after much auditioning, the Royal Albert Hall. The latter's achievement was all down to the youth organisation, CM, based in Tower Hamlets, which focuses on giving gigging and recoding opportunities to young musicians, free of charge. Working with CM eventually led to an audition for Music For Youth, which were happening

all over the country. On the second attempt, Red Kyte proceeded onto the next round: Birmingham Town Hall. With another band under the bracket of CM, we went to the Midlands to play our music, accompanied by CM staff, Trevor McKinley and Connal Kelleher. I was sick all day, and would've asked for anything to replace waiting around, sound checking and performing, in an uncharted city. A couple of months after Birmingham, however, the acts to play at the Royal Albert Hall for the Music For Youth proms were confirmed and, to much surprise, we were on it.

The Royal Albert Hall is one of the most prestigious venues in Britain, housing The Rolling Stones, Frank Sinatra, and even Muhammad Ali. We spent much of our day gawking at the photographs of these history-makers who had performed and entertained there previously,













as well as watching the other acts sound check, which ranged from orchestras, to brass bands, choirs, singersongwriters and folk duos. All of which were some of the best young musicians I have ever heard.

There have been many times in the past where I've felt wracked with nerves (drama performances and North London derbies to name a few), but none match the terror of standing in utter darkness before an audience of 5,000, especially when my pedal-board, a vital piece of equipment the whole band were relying on, practically crumbled before me. We carried on regardless, as there is no way of escaping a performance such as this, playing two of our own compositions, 'Wolf' and 'Inner City Living', to make up our 6-minute slot. The show concluded a few acts after ours, all of us feeling exhausted and surprised at how quickly 6 minutes can

go. A CM-made documentary is to be coming out shortly on our day at the Royal Albert Hall.

It was a fantastic experience, with nothing else really to compare with it, and it marked a turning point in the course of Red Kyte's career. The post-gig thaw that has followed has been one of quiet recollection, but we can now look ahead to more gigging and recording opportunities on the horizon.

We will be taking a year out between sixth form and university to work on our music, and see if we can carry on with the adrenaline gained from the Royal Albert Hall. The performance will long live in my memory, as it will for the other members of Red Kyte, but it could not have been done if youth charities like CM were not here to oversee it.
