Sociology: Unlocking Society's Secrets

Sociology is the study of society, social behavior, and the forces that shape our lives. At its heart, it explores three fundamental questions:

What is happening in society?

- Identifying social trends, patterns, and inequalities.
- Examples: Rising crime rates, changing family structures, increased social media use.

Why is it happening?

- Exploring the underlying causes and factors driving social phenomena.
- Overlaps with: History, Politics, Psychology
- Examples: Poverty, discrimination, lack of education.

What can be done about it?

- Developing solutions and strategies to address social problems and improve society.
- Overlaps with: Social Policy, Economics, Ethics
- Examples: Social programs, policy changes, community initiatives.

Course Expectations: Your Commitment to Success

A Level Sociology is a challenging but rewarding course. To succeed, you'll need to be prepared to commit time, effort, and organisation.

- **Time Commitment:** Expect to dedicate between 4 and 5 hours per week outside of lessons for reading, research, and homework.
- Organisation: Keep your notes organised, meet deadlines, and actively participate in class discussions.
- **Effort:** Engage with the material, ask questions, and be prepared to think critically about complex social issues.

1. Watch, Read, Think:

- Read: A news article or blog post about a current social trend.
- **Think:** Reflect on what you've watched and read. What are the key issues? What are the different perspectives? How does this relate to your own life?

2. Mini Research Task:

Sociology is all about asking questions. Pick **one** of the following questions and write 300–500 words in response. Use real-world examples and include your opinion.

- Has family life in the UK changed for better or worse in recent years?
- Is education fair? Who benefits most from our current system?
- Why does crime exist? Can it ever be fully prevented?
- Does the media reflect society, or does it shape it?
