Aims

Our school has the highest aspirations for all our students and we make every effort to ensure that our students who are not financially advantaged get excellent support. We believe that the core focus for us to enable outstanding progress is to ensure excellent teaching and learning in every lesson: we therefore want to shift some funding in to ensuring this happens – particularly to ensuring our FSM students get excellent feedback (see education endowment fund) on how to improve. The school recognises that students who receive FSM will also benefit in terms of having additional educational support outside the classroom. Some of our funding is used to give targeted tutoring and small group teaching.

Provision in 2014-15

Student eligible to benefit from the PPG during 2014-15 will have benefited from one or more of the following, which have been funded or part funded through the PPG:

- Smaller class sizes in English, maths, science at KS3
- Smaller option groups at KS4
- One to one tuition
- Involvement in intervention groups for English and maths
- Provision of additional revision guides and books
- Subsidised places on school visits which go beyond core provision
- Weekend revision sessions in Year 11
- Saturday school
- Behaviour intervention sessions for KS3 students
- Study Skills sessions for KS4

Measuring the impact of PPG funding in 2014-15

School

- For year 11 the impact of intervention groups and one to one tuition for our students who came to us with level 4 and/or KS2 total points of 10-12 was positive – and there was an increase in students making expected progress compared to previous years.

In particular in mathematics the students who came to us with level 4 made very good progress – well above national non FSM figures.

Across the English Baccalaureate GCSE's: maths, English, science, languages and history or geography the pupil premium students had significantly better attainment than national averages. In particular the percentage passes for pupil premium students in mathematics (64% school; 53% national), science (73% school; 58% national), languages (97% school; 59% national) and humanities (60% school; 49% national) were significantly better than national averages. Progress across mathematics, English, science and languages was significantly better at SNS than it is nationally for pupil premium students.
